<b>Workshop title</b>	Monitoring and evaluation for development in peace-precarious situations

<b>Workshop content</b>	<p>In the context of initiatives that absorb disproportionate resources with unmeasured impact, we urgently need to assess how sustainably, on what timeline, and depending on what factors we can expect development in peace-precarious situations to succeed. The workshop uses theory and field examples along with participatory group work on case studies. We will cover key differentiating features of development in peace-precarious situations, and work with models that help us analyse and strengthen M&amp;E/evaluation design and implementation. We will explore the varying usefulness for different cases of six dimensions of potential stress, to practice analysing peace-precarious development situations in ways that strengthen their M&amp;E/evaluation. We will incorporate additional methods and approaches as appropriate to timely cases in current events.</p>
